

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Australian Polio Register




There are currently 1488 polio survivors on the Australian Polio Register and this number increases daily. However, we know there are many more thousands of polio survivors out there. Because we have limited resources to promote the Polio Register widely in the community we are enlisting your help to spread the word. **To make the Australian Polio Register truly reflective of the unmet need for polio services throughout Australia, we urge every Australian polio survivor to join the Polio Register.**

The publishable data in the Register can be sorted in various ways (family name, maiden name, given names, birth year, polio year, age at which polio contracted, or location where polio contracted) – just click the appropriate button to go to the particular sort order in which you are interested.

The End of Polio Concert



On Friday 28th October thousands of Australians joined an incredible line up of artists at the Belvoir Amphitheatre in Perth, Australia to raise their voices in support of polio eradication. The Concert set out to highlight our generation's opportunity to end this debilitating disease, and change the course of history. Thousands of campaign supporters from around the country came together to hear live music from a great line-up of national and international music stars, and raise their voices in support of investment in polio eradication. Also invited to speak was Indian born Canadian polio survivor, [Ramesh Ferris](#). Ramesh is a popular public speaker on the subject of polio eradication.

As Commonwealth leaders met to discuss global and Commonwealth issues, "[The End of Polio](#)" campaigners combined the power and the pull of a concert with the passion and influence of a community driven movement - to propel polio eradication onto the international agenda.

The culmination of months of local campaigning, "[The End of Polio Concert](#)" brought together thousands of people to call on world leaders to realise this monumental opportunity - providing a compelling mandate for Australian, and Commonwealth, leaders to invest in polio eradication efforts and close the funding gap currently limiting vaccination efforts.

Australia Pledges \$50m for Polio Eradication

Prime Minister Julia Gillard has used the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting in Perth to flag her intention to significantly boost Australia's commitment to wiping out polio worldwide. Australia will give \$50million over four years to the Global Polio Eradication Initiative for the purchase of vaccines and to monitor and respond to polio outbreaks.

Shortly before starting the conference's two-day leaders' retreat at Perth's Kings Park yesterday, Ms Gillard was joined in making the announcement by British Prime Minister David Cameron, Canadian Prime Minister Stephen Harper, Pakistan's Prime Minister Yousaf Raza Gilani and Nigerian President Goodluck Jonathan.



Ms Gillard pointed out that when the Queen first visited Perth in 1954, it was in the grip of a polio epidemic to which former Labor leader and current ambassador to Washington Kim Beazley fell victim as a child.

Microsoft co-founder Bill Gates joined in the announcement via videolink and said his foundation - the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation - would pledge a further \$US40million (\$A37.3million) to the initiative. Mr Gates praised the Australian Government for putting the polio issue on the CHOGM agenda.

\$47 Million in Health and Medical Research Funding to Meet the Challenges of Ageing

Vitamin and Mineral Supplement Use in Relation to All-Cause Mortality in the Iowa Women's Health Study - Comment on "Dietary Supplements and Mortality Rate in Older Women"

"Based on existing evidence, we see little justification for the general and widespread use of dietary supplements, unless there is a medical reason or deficiency of a particular nutrient," wrote the study authors, most of whom are affiliated with the University of Minnesota.

"In agreement with our hypothesis, most of the supplements studied were not associated with a reduced total mortality rate in older women. In contrast, we found that several commonly used dietary vitamin and mineral supplements, including multivitamins, vitamins B6, and folic acid, as well as minerals iron, magnesium, zinc, and copper, were associated with a higher risk of total mortality. Of particular concern, supplemental iron was strongly and dose dependently associated with increased total mortality risk. Also, the association was consistent across shorter intervals, strengthened with multiple use reports and with increasing age at reported use. Supplemental calcium was consistently inversely related to total mortality rate; however, no clear dose-response relationship was observed - iron is suggested to catalyze reactions that produce oxidants and thus promote oxidative stress."

Dietary supplementation has shifted from preventing deficiency to trying to promote wellness and prevent diseases. Consumers believe that vitamin and mineral supplements are safe and use them without the supervision of their physicians. Until recently, the available data regarding the adverse effects of dietary supplements has been limited and grossly underreported.

"We think the paradigm "the more the better" is wrong. One should consider the likely U-shaped relationship between micronutrient status and health. We believe that for all micronutrients, risks are associated with insufficient and too-large intake. Low levels of intake increase the risk of deficiency. High levels of intake increase the risk of toxic effects and disease. Therefore, we believe that politicians and regulatory authorities should wake up to their responsibility to allow only safe products on the market."

China Vaccinates 4.5M Children, Young Adults Against Polio After Outbreak

"China vaccinated 4.5 million children and young adults over the last five weeks in the western region of Xinjiang in a fight against polio after the disease paralyzed 17 people and killed one of them," the World Health Organization said, according to [Reuters](#). This is the first outbreak of polio in China since 1999, "and scientists say the strain originated from Pakistan, one of four remaining countries where polio is endemic," the news service writes.

Polio Cases Linked to Heat-Affected Vaccines

Health authorities in Sindh have expressed doubts about the efficacy of polio vaccines provided by the World Health Organisation for use during immunisation campaigns against the dreaded disease, which has affected 27 children

in Sindh so far this year, it emerged on Monday.

Polio officials and field workers, concerned at the detection of the cases among the children who had received a number of oral polio vaccine doses during polio campaigns, fear polio vaccines may not be as effective as they should be, said a source in the health department, adding that the WHO had recently been requested to provide Oral Polio Vaccines (OPV) with zero-stage vaccine vial monitor (VVM).

The provincial health department also took up the issues of stability of OPV at different temperatures, particularly the vaccine's maintenance at the end-user places. Reports say that the OPV with a late stage VVM (indicating that a vaccine has been exposed to heat for long) have also been used during campaigns due to inconsistent cold chains, low-level education of workers or for other reasons, the source added.

However, experts maintained that there was a margin of safety built into the VVM so that even a late stage VVM might be potent, but the vaccine had had enough exposure to heat that it should be discarded because it was potentially weakened. Using a vaccine with a late-stage VVM is not harmful, but it might not offer immunity, it was further noted.

No Polio Outbreak in South Africa

The Department of Health has assured the public that there is no need for panic after a 10-month-old baby with a very rare and severe congenital immune system condition developed polio after being given an oral polio vaccination. The National Institute for Communicable Diseases (NICD) confirmed at the weekend that the baby, from Gauteng, had developed the rare complication which has occurred in only 23 people across the world since the introduction of the oral poliovirus vaccine (OPV) in the previous century.

Fidel Hadebe, national Department of Health spokesperson, said: "The NICD became aware of the case recently through their monitoring programme." He assured the public that there was no need to panic because, "South Africa remains free of polio".

The last confirmed case of polio in South Africa was in 1989. However, the threat of imported polio remains a possibility as has been demonstrated by polio outbreaks in formerly polio-free African countries.

A Statistical Model of the International Spread of Wild Poliovirus in Africa Used to Predict and Prevent Outbreaks

Using outbreak data from 2003-2010, researchers were able to develop a statistical model of the spread of wild polioviruses in Africa that can predict polio outbreaks six months in advance.

Kathleen O'Reilly of Imperial College London, UK and colleagues indicated that outbreaks of polio in Africa over the study period resulted mainly from continued transmission in Nigeria and other countries that reported polio cases, and from poor immunization status.

The authors highlight how the geographical risk of polio is changing over time in Africa, saying "As the incidence of polio in Nigeria has remained very low in 2010 and 2011, there may be a unique opportunity to eliminate polio from Africa in the near-term through targeted vaccination informed by appropriate predictive models." Scathing Report: Polio Eradication "Not... Any Time Soon"

An independent monitoring board convened by the worldwide polio-eradication initiative has delivered a [report on the global effort](#) that is striking for its brutally frank and even frustrated tone. Among its findings, just in its first few pages: "Case numbers are rising"; "unwelcome surprises continue"; "as many milestones are being missed as are being met"; and "the (eradication) Programme is not on track for its end-2012 goal, or for any time soon after unless fundamental problems are tackled." Possibly the biggest problem, the board concludes, is a get-it-done optimism so ingrained in the 23-year effort that it cannot acknowledge when things are not working. A new web site on social data for polio eradication was launched this week by UNICEF: www.polioinfo.org. Polio eradication efforts rely heavily on a range of social data that help shed light on, among other things, the reasons some communities are refusing to vaccinate their children with oral polio vaccine (OPV). The web site, which will be fully integrated with www.polioeradication.org, aims to support and strengthen communication efforts in all the polio priority countries by making this critical social data easier to access.

In Pakistan, 14 new cases are reported in the past week - it is the highest number of new cases reported in a single week ever. See 'Pakistan' section below for more information.

In Nigeria, polio has spread more widely in the past two months than at any time over the last two years.
